










McMullen Creek Tributary Storm Water Run-off Along Emory Lane (Under R-3)

- ©S. Emory Lane: Persistent Flooding After Only an Hour's Steady Rain Flood Plain Begins.












We are working with Mr. Gary Wright of your Engineering Department on a severe erosion and flooding problem due to surface water coming down Linda Lane, Craig Avenue and surrounding high ground. After entering McMullen Creek it becomes a river causing serious damage to our properties.

When we purchased our properties fifteen years ago it was possible to jump across the creek. Due to erosion and flooding, it is today approximately 15 to 20 feet wide.

My neighbors' adjoining properties have a similar situation and we are very interested in finding a solution.

Charlotte's Storm Drainage Repair Policy Book states that a petition is needed for a study and estimate to qualify under policy requirements listed in above edition.

We, the undersigned, are presenting this petition requesting that a study and estimate be made of our properties with suggestions for a possible resolution to this problem.

The creek when flooded is 100 to 125 feet wide and is trying to cut a new bed eroding approximately one-third of our properties.

Mr. Richard Lowell's property at 4315 Emory Lane, my next door neighbor, has flooding into his crawl space.

We are located approximately one and one-half blocks north of a flood zone where McMullen Creek crosses Sharon Amity,


